An Herb Grower's Handbook," can

When growing herbs for culinary, aromatic or medicinal purposes, beginning gardeners should consider starting with just three to five types.

This will allow time to learn about growing, caring for and using the herbs. A smaller garden also is less likely to overwhelm a beginning gardener.

In preparing to establish an herb garden, think about what herbs you like and how you will use them.

Are there culinary herbs you use frequently? Do you enjoy making and serving herb tea? Or will you cut or dry herbs for their fragrance?

Creating a new garden for herbs will highlight them, but the fragrant plants can be placed within existing gardens. Consider, for example, planting basil in a vegetable garden or placing lemon balm, an attractive, leafy bush, to accent perennials in an established flower bed.

Some people like to plant culinary herbs just outside the back door, a few steps away from the kitchen, but they will also grow in containers or a window box.

Herbs can be grown from seeds or plants. Some are perennials and others will need to be planted each year. Most are low maintenance and, because they are aromatic, naturally repel insects.

If choosing plants, gardeners might want to buy from local growers whose plants are proven in the area. Plants shipped to garden departments for sale in larger stores might not be as suited to local growing conditions.


