125 YEARS AGO — June 1880

The bill to divide the Kirwin Land District has passed the Senate and now only awaits the President's signature to become a law.

The east line of the new district runs through Norton County 30 miles east of Oberlin, and all the territory in the two northern tiers of counties in Kansas and west to the Colorado line is embraced in the district.

Our blacksmiths are kept busy repairing breaking plows. We venture the assertion that more prairie has been turned since the drenching rain of last week in Decatur County than any other county in the state.




