will be seeking input on from America's farmers, ranchers and rural residents regarding the development of the 2007 Farm Bill.

The next farm bill will affect America's entire agricultural community," he said. "That's why I want to ask farmers and ranchers how our farm policy is working and how we can make it better. I believe very strongly that they deserve a voice in this process."

The first Farm Bill Forum will be held in Nashville, Tenn., from 6 to 10 p.m. on Thursday, July 7, at RFD-TV Northstar Studios.

The public is invited to attend and participate in the forum, which will be broadcast live on RFD-TV.

In addition to accommodating some 300 in the audience, the forum also will accept calls from across the nation

The 2002 Farm Bill, which authorizes many of the programs operated by the agriculture department, expires with the 2007 crop year.

Secretary Johanns noted that he was approaching the forums with an open mind. "I do not begin this process with preconceived notions about the direction future farm policy should take," he said. "We will use the feedback we receive to help us determine the bet course for a new farm bill."

As the current Farm Bill covers

a diverse array of program areas, six topics have been identified to provide a framework for the forums. Primary topics addressed at the forums will reflect various concerns affecting rural Americans such as commodity, conservation, and rural economic development issues. In addition, some will be dedicated to other important programs authorized by the farm bill, such as food assistance, research and education programs.

The agriculture department will be seeking public discussion on farm policy considerations regarding: the competitiveness of U.S. agriculture in global and domestic markets; challenges facing new farmers and ranchers as they enter agriculture; appropriateness and effectiveness of the distribution of farm program benefits; achievement of conservation and environmental goals; and enhancement of rural economic growth and opportunities to expand agriculture products, markets and research.

The public will be invited to provide comments on six specific questions, which have been published in the June 17, 2005 Federal Register. Grants available for adult classes

Students in the Colby Commu-vices, credit and savings." nity College Adult Basic Education program can get help with child care and commuting costs.

Director Nance Munderloh said the college received a grant from the Wal-Mart Foundation to help with those costs.

The program served 149 students in northwest Kansas last year. Instructors help participants raise their skill levels in math, reading and writing as well as preparing for the General Equivalency Degree exam, which leads to a high school diploma awarded by the state Board of Regents.

One of the programs is Workplace Essentials, which includes instruction in correct methods to complete applications, writing letters of application, creating resumés, interviewing tips and suggestions to obtain, keep and improve job skills. Basic technology classes are offered three times each year.

Munderloh said new programs will be available this fall.

"New this fall at the Colby site is a 'Money Manager' seminar," she said. "The course includes instruction on budgeting, balancing check- cation instruction. Contact books and bank statements, understanding pay stubs, banking ser- 261.

The Adult Education program has also developed a course designed to serve potential military recruits to raise their skill levels in preparation for taking enlistment tests. Skills required are essentially the same as those required for the GED but are in a slightly different format.

Joe Mildrexler, dean of community services, said the college is considering new ventures.

"New partnerships are being explored in Hays, where the Adult Basic Education program has shown significant growth," said Mildrexler. "The center will be open an additional two evenings a week and a variety of courses and seminar-style classes will be offered."

The college will offer Fasttrack courses in areas not served by a Colby site.

"Program emphasis is being placed on bringing in more partners and specifically targeting their needs," said Mildrexler. "Quality programming with satisfied partners means great word-of-mouth advertising.'
