Because of the washout on the B. & M. tracks near Republican City, the company was running a train from Oberlin to the washout, and as they could not turn the engine around, it has been coming into Oberlin backwards. Saturday afternoon 2 miles east of Kanona, the tender jumped the track and the engine followed it into the ditch. Minnie Koll, 19-year-old daughter of Engineer Koll, and a young man by the name of White from Mexico, Mo., were killed. The injured included W.S. Langmade, Mrs. Koll, Conductor Lyman, Mrs. Lee Egbert, Miss Helen Parker and Leona Scott.

It is estimated that two-thirds of small grain in Logan Township has been destroyed by the hail.
