Bariteau, who was then in the lumber business. He came by train to Buffalo Park and started to walk from there but caught a ride with a freighter. The homes he built for the Bariteaus are still in use. He homesteaded a quarter section southeast of Oberlin and his wife's mother homesteaded an adjoining 80. He served two terms as county treasurer. He was a charter member of the Oberlin Odd Fellows Lodge and a Civil War veteran, serving at Fort Phil Kearney in Wyoming several years after the war ended. Funeral services were held at the Oberlin Presbyterian Church with Walker Hughes and Minnie LaTourette of the Christian Science Society in charge
