Monitoring the refrigerator

Refrigerator thermostats aren't always reliable.

Signals to buy a thermometer to check "fridge" temperatures include milk that starts smelling sour before the family can drink it or lettuce that gets too cold and freezes.

Refrigerator temperatures should register 34-40 degrees Fahrenheit. In this range, the bacteria that causes food to spoil grow slowly. Below 32 degrees, of course, food freezes. The bacteria will not grow, although they do survive.

Here are some additional tips for refrigerating food safely:

• Make quick food choices when opening the door, so the food inside stays cold.

• Don't pack the refrigerator too full. Cold air needs to circulate.

• Keep foods covered to keep them from drying out and their flavors from mixing.

• Store raw meat, fish and poultry on a plate or in plastic bags so juices can't drip onto other foods.

• If you have them, use the separate compartments for vegetables to keep them crisp, and the one for meats so they stay fresh longer.

· If you don't have a meat compartment, store meats on the lowest (coldest) shelf in the refrigerator.

 Store eggs in their original carton, not the refrigerator door (where the temperature varies most).


• Keep leftovers near the front of the refrigerator, so you'll see and use them within three or four days. • Keep shelves clean, and toss any

food that exceeds its use by date or becomes moldy.

This psalm says God knows everything there is to know about us - when we sit, when we lie down, what we're going to say before we think it. The writer also says God is before and behind us and that even the darkness is not dark to God.

I've heard people use this almost as a threat, saying something like, "You better behave. God knows what you're doing." Well, yes, God does know what we're doing but we shouldn't feel threatened by that, only comforted. I suppose it should make us think twice when we're doing, or saying, something we shouldn't but more importantly, it should make us know we are watched over and guarded every minute.

God created us out of love and wants only the best good way to begin each day.

Psalm 139:7 - "Where can I go from your spirit? for us. God gave humans free will, allows us to make decisions for ourselves, so there are times when we fall into sin or just make mistakes due to our own poor choices. God won't prevent us from doing dumb things.
