Rotary members hear about cabinet business

Lee Gilliam told Oberlin Rotary ideas, machinery and techniques in Club members how he started in the cabinet manufacturing business at their meeting at The Gateway last Tuesday

Mr. Gilliam, owner of Creative Dimensions, which has a plant in the industrial park just east of Oberlin, said that his father began working in the cabinet industry in 1956 and became a dealer in 1966. He started a cabinet operation in Omaha in 1968 and supplied cabinets to Montgomery Wards in the midwest.

His father helped him get started in the business in 1985. Since then, there have been big changes and growth in the industry in the past 25 years. They began with laminate and have since switched to Formica for cabinets. Other changes have included the use of electronics and computers, along with e-mail, faxes and telephone marketing and sales. Computer pricing, he said, calculates costs, materials and labor, and automated machinery with programmed codes makes designs, angles and cuts.

He said that hardware from Austria is used in construction of the cabinets and they are all put together with dowels. He often attends trade shows which demonstrate new

cabinet manufacturing.
