'Wrestling with God' By Pastor Doug Hasty of the United Methodist churches of Oberlin and Prairie Chapel

You can find the story of Jacob wrestling with face." As dawn breaks, this mysterious adversary knocks Jacob's hip out of joint and insists that Jacob let him go. But Jacob refuses to let go until he receives the promise of a blessing. So the antagonist gives Jacob a new name, Israel, "the one who strives with God."

This story might seem strange to us, yet it's not that difficult to relate to when we plug in our own experiences. How many of us have had a sleepless night struggling with our conscience or trying to justify ourselves for some hurt we inflicted? How many of us have suspected God was calling us to something we weren't keen on and found sleep elusive? And how many of us have sought God's blessing, and been given it, but left without a clear sense of what do next?

God the adversary, even picturing God as the aggressor, isn't that hard to comprehend. > When we encounter God, we undergo a perspective change, an attitude adjustment. Jacob could've said, "Well, I got whupped." Or he could say, "Hey, I got a new name.'

> If we were to speak of Jacob's struggle as a midlife crisis, let's remember that a crisis is a turning point. Crisis in this sense signifies that moment in which we realize all our defenses, all our familiar maneuvers have come to naught, when we are forced to take a long hard look at ourselves—"warts and all"—at all our success and all our failures and for the first time really confront the question: "Who are you, really? What are you about?" And then, you have to make a decision about that, to actually choose between alternative paths. Then we are close to the spiritual meaning of the term "midlife crisis."

That is precisely what is happening to Jacob at this critical moment in his life. Left all alone in the dark, and facing what he believes will probably be the fight lies his way through our defenses to demand our of his life, he is addressed from a surprising and unexpected source while his guard is down.
