## Used furniture store opens

Marilou Long and Pat Chard have opened Furniture Alley, a used furniture store at 121 1/2 S. Rodehaver Ave., in the alley behind Shear Creations West.

The store handles donated furniture. All proceeds go to community projects, much the same as Bargain Box Plus, which is also owned by Mrs. Long, at 106 N. Beaver.

The women said there is a demand for nice used dressers and tables and the store has lamps, couches, chairs, wall decor, desks and some antiques.

Access is from the alley. The store is open Friday and Saturday morn-

ings or by appointment by calling the Bargain Box Plus at 475-3234. Volunteers are needed to help run the store, the women said.

Hours at Bargain Box Plus are from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Wednesdays and Saturdays, and from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. other weekdays. Ann Mines helps Mrs. Long at the store, along with volunteers.

Ms. Chard operates Scrounge Around, an antique and collectible shop just south of Bargain Box Plus at 102 N. Beaver. Her hours are from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Saturday, or by appointment.

Many community projects have

benefited from proceeds from Bargain Box Plus. The women say they want to offer the furniture as a service since there is no longer a furniture store in Oberlin.

"Our motto is 'To serve the people,'" they said.

The Hansen Museum at Logan is exhibiting a house, sometimes referred to as a shack or cabin, which African-Americans of the south might have called home, through Sept. 18.

Booked through Exhibits USA, "Whispers" will allow viewers to take a trip back in time. It highlights lifelike charcoal of people who might have lived in a dwelling such as this.

Built to actual size, this installation by Whitfield Lovell arrived in sections of walls, flooring and roof.

The dingy interior mirrors the life of these poor southerners during the 1920s.

Artist of the month is Janet Gottstine of Logan, who has brought the outdoors in with her green thumb. She starts her creations from seed and after months of nurturing, she presents beautiful fall plants ready to burst into bloom. Among them are mums, asters and creeping Nancy in a variety of colors.
