Listen to kids describe allergies

Children suffer the most from food allergies. How they describe their reactions after eating a food they react to can help parents and doctors pinpoint the problem.

The Food Allergy and Anaphylaxis Network developed a list of words children may use to describe problems.

- Here are examples of what children may say to describe problems:
- Food tastes spicy.
 - My tongue is hot (or burns).
 - Something is poking my tongue.
 - My tongue is tingling (or itches).
 - My tongue feels like there is hair on it.
 - My mouth feels funny.
 - There's a frog in my throat.
 - Something is stuck in my throat (but they're not choking).

- My tongue feels heavy.
 - My ears feel like bugs are in them.
 - My lips feel tight.
 - My throat feels thick.
 - I feel a bump in the back of my throat.
- Did you also know some non-food products may contain food ingredients that trigger allergic reactions? Personal care products such

as shampoo, conditioner, lotion and sunscreen may contain milk, eggs, nuts, peanuts or other food allergens. Be sure to read the label.


