

County skeptical of prisoner drug plan

Randy Allen with the Kansas Association of Counties called to discuss the program at the meeting last Tuesday. The idea, he said, is to help law enforcement agencies with prescription costs.

Commissioner Doyle Brown said he attended a meeting in Norton where the program was discussed. He said he talked with Sheriff Ken Badsky about the program, but the jail has a small prescription drug bill each year and the program isn't really needed here.

Under the program, drugs would

agreed to look at a prescription drug reimbursed for any drugs an inmate didn't use.

Sheriff Badsky talked with commissioners about paperwork for a "STEP" grant through the Kansas Highway Patrol which will help pay sheriff's officers for time they work on holidays and during special promotions like drunk driving awareness or child safety seats.
