# County to get money for plan

The Decatur County Health Department received notification that the county will get \$59 more money than last year to spend on preparations in case of a biological disaster.

Health Administrator Marilyn Gamblin said the plan is the same as last year. She needs to get it signed by commissioners and then the health department will get 25 percent of the money. After Ms. Gamblin turns in the budget, the department will get another quarter of the budget.

The plan says the county is supposed to have a bioterrorism drill each year, said County Attorney

Steve Hirsch. Has this been done? No, said Ms. Gamblin, but the state hasn't done the drill each year, and they are supposed to.

The plan was approved and signed by commissioners.

The plan is just if there is an act of terrorism in the county. It sets up a way to react and the money Ms. Gamblin receives is to be used to purchase things that would help in case there is an act of terrorism. For instance she purchased a generator to help keep her vaccine cold.

Bioterrorism could be any attack that isn't a natural disaster.

After the attacks on Sept. 11, the state started to send out plans for bioterrorism and asked counties to make plans, just in case.

Ms. Gamblin said she has sent out letters to parents of seniors at the Decatur Community High School noting that the county will have hepatitis B shots.

The vaccine is ordered and the shots will be done at the school, she

The health department is teaming up with the Oberlin Rotary Club to pay for the vaccines, which are recommended for students going to

It is almost time for flu shots, said Day on Saturday.
