The case began more than two years ago when Kenneth Petracich, 51, was arrested for sexual misconduct involving a minor in April 2003.

That's 29 months Mr. Petracich has been in the Sherman County Bastille. He underwent psychological testing as part of the pre-sentencing process before the hearing Friday in Sherman County District Court.

The case has been put on hold several times as the defense requested continuances for mental health evaluations. The most recent delay happened in July when a defense witnesses could not be present for the hearing.

Mr. Petracich had admitted taking indecent liberties with a 4-year-old in 2003, exposing himself and having the child touch him.


