County discusses fireworks money

discussed how to handle money they've set aside for the annual Fourth of July fireworks show when they met last Tuesday.

The sponsoring Oberlin Business Alliance hasn't received a bill for the show for the last three years, and members worry that the money might not be there when they get it.

Each year, the county pledges \$500 towards the fireworks display. Oberlin also pledges \$500 and Rusty Addleman of the alliance raises the rest.

County Clerk Marilyn Horn said the county has the money set aside for the fireworks, at \$500 a year for the last few years. In the past, she said, all of the money for fireworks has gone through the county treasurer's office so the purchase is tax free.

County Attorney Steve Hirsch said there is some question about whether they should pay that amount each year when it is in the budget.

Mrs. Horn said maybe they should write a check for the approximate amount each year for Flash Fireworks. but the commissioners didn't make any decisions.

Mrs. Horn said she has had some calls about seeing if the old county shop can be made into a recycling building and then building an eightcar garage or something similar to store the vehicles which are there.

Commissioner Ralph Unger said he doesn't want to build anything else down by the old county shop because the area is prone to flood-

Noxious Weed Director Gaylen Huntley called to say he is ready to order 100 gallons or more of Tordon for spraying. The price will be under \$10,000. He said the county needs it for fall spraying of musk thistle. Commissioners approved the purchase.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Tim There was no action taken.

Decatur County commissioners Stallman said some of the crew is pulling gravel in on the roads again to get ready for harvest, while others are mowing.

Marilyn Gamblin, county health administrator, said she plans to start giving shots for high-risk people on Wednesday and Thursday, Oct. 19 and 20.

High-risk patients include people 65 and older with long-term health problems like heart disease, lung disease, asthma, diabetes and kidney disease.

High risk also includes people with cancer or AIDS.

With fall setting in, it's time to high risk patients to call the office at 475-8118 to set an appointment.

The flu shots will cost \$22 this year. If anyone wants an pneumonia shot, it will cost \$30.

The flu shots are an inactivated vaccine, so people should not get sick from them.

Ms. Gamblin said she ordered over 1,200 and has 420 of them in already. She is still waiting on the rest, but plans on getting them.

By the end of the month or beginning of November, she said, she hopes to start giving shots to everyone else.

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
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Forms for shots needed

The Decatur County Health Department and Oberlin Rotary Club have teamed up to offer free hepatitis B shots to seniors this year.

Marilyn Gamblin, county health administrator, said letters were mailed two weeks ago with consent forms to parents of the senior class. So far, she said, she has only received a handful back.

Students who don't have a consent form will not receive a shot, she said. These normally cost \$15 a shot or \$45 for the series. They are required now by most Kansas colleges.

Forms need to be returned to Ms. Gamblin by Monday. After that, she will set up a school day to administer the shots.
