State troopers said the accident happened when the driver of the Excursion made a left turn into the Colby Bowl and Fun Center about 8:30 p.m., failing to yield to the 2003 Yamaha motorcycle, which was headed north. The motorcycle struck the left front corner of the vehicle, killing both riders, according to the Kansas Highway Patrol
