

Red Devils lose to Oakley

Oberlin shut out 30-0 in Homecoming game

The Oakley Plainsmen shut out the Decatur Community High Red Devils 38-0 on Friday, but still couldn't ruin Oberlin's Homecoming.

Oberlin may not have won the game, as the Plainsmen scored 8 points in the first quarter, 14 in the second, 8 in the third and 6 in the fourth, but the weather was cool and the festivities went forward.

Anne Wasson was named Homecoming queen during a pep assembly at school Friday and Jonathon Richards was crowned king during the dance after the game.

Still, the Red Devils have gone from a 3-0 record to 3-3. The team beat St. Francis, Quinter and Colby early in the season, but has dropped games to Goodland, Atwood and Oakley in the last three weeks.

"Friday's game against Oakley was a situation in which we played a very good football team and we again struggled to put together a consistent, productive football game," Coach Trevor Williams

said. "As a coach, I am going to have to find a way to get the guys back on track.

"We definitely have to find an answer to the struggles we've faced the last several weeks."

Quarterback Denton Bailey was three for 10 in the air for 45 yards on Friday. Jesse Juenemann caught two passes for 33 yards and Garrit Peters one for 12 yards.

On the ground, Richards was the top rusher, carrying the ball nine times for 23 yards. He was followed by Josh Fortin, five for 13; Jeb Tally, two for nine; Juenemann, two for eight; Jason Thomas, one for one; and Bailey, three for none.

Thomas was the leading Oberlin tackler with 5 solos and 11 assists. He was followed by Richards, 4 solos, six assists; Fortin, two solos, 13 assists; Terry Urban, two solos, 13 assists; Juenemann, three solos, four assists; Jacob Unger, one solo, eight assists; Bailey, one solo, six assists; Drew Martin, one solo, five assists; Peters, five assists; Joe Mondero

and Bret Marietta, 4 assists each; Chet Ely, three assists; and Regan Badsky, Nolan May, Andy Gilliam and Gabe Moore, one assist each.

"A positive for us is that we will now be going into district play, and

at this time in the season, records don't matter for succeeding," Coach Williams said.

"Basically, it's a new season, and hopefully we can come in to this with a new perspective."

Oberlin will play host to the Stockton Tigers with a 7 p.m. kickoff on Friday for the first district contest. Then on Friday, Oct. 21, the Red Devils will be in Hill City to play the Ringnecks. On Friday, Oct.

27, Oberlin will have its last regular game against the Hoxie Indians in Oberlin.

The top two teams in the district will advance to the state playoffs.

Volleyball girls win three matches

The Decatur Community High volleyball girls downed Brewster, Goodland and Rawlins County last Tuesday to sweep a quadrangular meet at Goodland.

In the first match, Oberlin downed Brewer 25-16, 25-13.

"Brewster is a very scrappy team," Coach Pat Dorshorst said. "We played aggressive offense but had to be ready for everything coming back. It was a great team effort."

Top players were:

- Server — Emmie Pauls, 13 of 13.

- Passer — Christa Hardy, 32 of 32 with seven perfect.

- Setter — Lauren Fortin, 29 of 29 with three assists.

- Hitter — Emmie Pauls, 18 of 21 with seven kills.

- Blocker — Tricia Dorshorst, four points stopped.

It took Oberlin three games, 25-12, 16-25, 25-21, to down Goodland.

"Oberlin dominated the first game and went to sleep on serve receive the second game," Coach Dorshorst said. We made some early errors and lost our composure. The team regrouped and played well the third game."

- Passer — Hardy, 23 of 24 with eight perfect.

Oberlin downed Rawlins County in two games, 25-18, 25-20.

"Rawlins County is a good ball club," Coach Dorshorst said.

"We had to really scrap for every point. The Oberlin team did a better job of composing themselves after errors and staying aggressive."

The Oberlin junior varsity team

lost to Brewster, 25-20, 25-14; beat Goodland in three, 17-25, 25-23 and 16-14; and lost in three to Rawlins County, 24-16, 25-17, 17-15.

The C-team beat Brewster, 25-21, 25-22; Goodland, 25-17, 25-15; and Rawlins County 25-20, 25-10.

"It was a good night of volleyball," Coach Dorshorst said. "There were four good teams that were playing well. Oberlin did a nice job of regrouping in a new lineup after losing senior setter Kaitlyn Stapp to a torn ACL (knee ligament) in the Oberlin tournament this past Saturday."

Saturday, the girls will be in the Northwest Kansas League Tournament in Quinter. Play starts at 10 a.m.

The Oberlin fourth-grade kid football team beat Colby, 33-13, Oct. 1 but the fifth and sixth graders lost, 22-7.

Dayton Dreher was the top player for the fourth graders with 191 yards, 13 points, seven tackles and an interception. Rhett Mizer was second with 69 yards, 7 points, 10 tackles and a fumble recovery.

State changes licensing

Some deer hunting seasons have opened, but for those who have not purchased their permits, there are several changes.

The Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks recently introduced the Kansas Outdoor Automated Licensing System. All licenses, permits and registrations, including deer permits, are now processed through a centralized, secure data-

base. This allows hunters to purchase their big game permits, turkey permits and deer/turkey game tags from all license vendors or on-line at www.kdwp.state.ks.us.

Hunters may call (800) 918-2877 for phone sales, allowing 5-10 days for processing and mailing of their permit.

2005 deer seasons include: Firearms: Nov. 30-Dec. 11; Archery: Oct. 1-Dec. 31. Hunter orange is required in firearms season. Muzzleloader: Sept. 10-23 and Nov. 30-Dec. 11.

Firearms Extended Whitetail Antlerless: Jan. 1-8 (in Units 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 and 19).

2005 Fall Turkey Seasons: Firearms and Archer: Oct. 1-Nov. 29; Dec. 12-31; and Jan. 9-31.

Registration will begin at 8 a.m. with class to start at 8:30 a.m. and end between 5 and 5:30 p.m.
