## Colby college president to retire

Dr. Mikel Ary, president of Colby Community College since 1988, plans to retire Nov. 1.

The third president in the school's history, he is one of the longest-serving community college presidents in

"It's been a privilege and honor to serve as the president of Colby Community College," said Dr. Ary. "I appreciate the confidence and support of the board of trustees and my administrative team during the past 17 years.

"Teamwork has made the advancement of CCC possible. Trustees, faculty, staff, students, alumni and friends all play an important role in the progress of the school. I am grateful for the opportunity I was afforded to contribute to the success

of the college.' The 40-year-old college experienced considerable growth and achievement during Dr. Ary's tenure. Full-time equivalency student numbers (which determine state funding) grew from a low of 735 in college. 1984-85 to 1,247 in 1995-96 and

1,210 in 2001-02. growth were the addition of acaand dental hygiene, as well as the acquisition of venture capital through two significant grant

sources. Because of the growth, two new buildings were added. The Health Sciences Building was completed in 1991, and the 20,000 square-foot Bedker Memorial Complex, the most recent addition to the campus, was finished in October 1997. A


