Animal officer hired to patrol, pick up strays

The Oberlin City Council hired a city employee Thursday as a parttime animal control officer to patrol five hours a week and be in charge of picking up stray animals.

At the regular council meeting, City Administrator Gary Shike told the council that Cody John works for the city in the kitchen at The Gateway and has some experience with animal control in Las Vegas.

Mr. Shike said the former animal control officer, Elmer Zodrow. came in a couple weeks ago and said it isn't practical for him to do the work anymore. Mr. Zodrow said he would help take the dogs to the shelter in McCook if he is needed.

Mr. John lives four miles out of town, the administrator said, so if he gets called out, the normal \$10-adog fee isn't really worth driving into town. At one time, said Mr. Shike, the council talked about having someone patrol the city. He said he sent City Attorney Steve Hirsch an e-mail on this, but didn't hear

Is the animal control officer's job strictly to deal with dogs? asked Councilman Joe Stanley. The city has Max Hafner to deal with skunks, said Mr. Shike. He gets paid by the

What about all the cats running around? asked Mr. Stanley.

The city doesn't deal with cats, said City Clerk Deanna Castle; they aren't required to be tagged.

The council agreed to hire Mr. John, paying him \$100 a month, \$10 an animal and \$15 an animal if he has to dispose of it. The council agreed to pay mileage if the animal is taken to the Humane Society in


