UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 294, Decatur County, Kansas RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

The above-named school board shall be authorized to make an annual tax levy for a period not to exceed five (5) years in an amount to not to exceed four (4) mills upon the taxable tangible property in the school district for the purpose of acquisition, construction, reconstruction, repair, remodeling, additions to, furnishing and equipping of buildings necessary for school district purposes, including housing and boarding pupils enrolled in an area vocational school operated under the board, architectural expenses incidental thereto, the acquisition of building sites, the undertaking and maintenance of asbestos control projects, the acquisition of school buses and the acquisition of other equipment and for the purpose of paying a portion of the principal and interest on bonds issued by cities under the authority of K.S.A. 12-1774, and amendments thereto, for the financing of redevelopment projects upon property located within the school district. The tax levy authorized by this resolution may be made, unless a petition in opposition to the same, signed by not less than 10% of the qualified electors of the school district, is filed with the county election officer of the home county of the school district within 40 days after the last publication of this resolution. In the event a petition is filed, the county election officer shall submit the question of whether the tax levy shall be authorized to the electors in the school district at an election called for the purpose or at the next general election, as is specified by the Board of Education of the Oberlin Unified School District No. 294

Reducing your influenza risk

People die from the flu unnecessarily. The U.S. Department of Health cites the influenza virus, commonly called "the flu," as the sixth-leading cause of death in our country, and reports 20,000-40,000 Americans die from it each year.

The virus is highly contagious. It spreads through inhalation of droplets of respiratory secretions when persons who have the flu cough or sneeze. The virus also can be spread by personal contact, either shaking hands, or touching a doorknob, telephone or other surface that someone who has the flu just touched.

Here are some suggestions for ways to avoid catching the flu:

 Ask your doctor about getting a flu shot. The shots can boost immunity 70-90 percent and are most effective when given two to three weeks before flu season, which typically lasts from December to March. If you miss the recommended time frame, however, getting a shot later may still offer increased immunity. The shots must be given each year, as flu viruses mutate and change.

• Strive for a healthy lifestyle – fruits and vegetables, drink plenty of fluids including water, and get

Adults who have the flu typically are contagious for five to seven days from the onset of fever. Children may be contagious for 7-10 days or longer, especially to those who may have an immune system comprised by a chronic illness such as asthma or diabetes.

Certain environments may increase risk as well. Examples would be children in a day-care or older adults living in a nursing home. Incubation period for the fluis 1-

4 days. This is one reason why the illness can spread through a school, workplace or community quickly. Common symptoms include headaches, muscle aches, and joint pain; fatigue; sore throat; a dry, hacking cough that progresses to a wet eat a variety of foods, including cough, producing mucous; fever, with or without chills; nasal congestion, water eyes, runny nose; and vomiting and diarrhea (more common in children under 6). The flu is avoid touching your nose, eyes and a viral illness that may subside with adequate rest, increasing fluid intake and targeting symptoms, such as taking cold medicine for a runny

Complications from the flu include pneumonia, an earache or fluid in the ears, persistent fever or return of a fever that has previously subsided, wheezy cough, rapid or irregular heartbeat, or chronic ill-

ness such as asthma that worsens and signals the need to follow up with a health care professional.

While smokers can have a greater risk of bronchitis and pneumonia as complications from the flu, others including small children with immune systems not fully developed and the elderly, whose immune systems may be compromised by age or chronic illness, face an increased

Avian influenza—or bird flu—is

a viral respiratory infection in birds. Scientists are studying the illness infecting small flocks of birds primarily in southeast Asia. While it has not yet been reported in birds or humans in the United States, there So far, the 126 people to date who

have been diagnosed with the disease have been people working directly with infected flocks. Research on the 2005 bird flu continues, and so it's a good idea to keep up with the news. Tranda Watts is Kansas State


