Two young ladies of Oberlin and vicinity had a pleasant party at the residence of Mr. Hitchcock on the 4th inst. Among those present were Misses Blanche and Bertha Rodehaver, Serena Griggs, Anna Persinger and May and Carrie Bridle.

There are now at Logan two carloads of corn, 80 half sacks of flour and one barrel of pork, assigned to R.G. Doom for the destitute of Decatur County. These goods were shipped from Brown and Doniphan counties.

100 YEARS AGO — Dec. 1905

75 YEARS AGO — Dec. 1925

Playing before a crowd of some 2,000 spectators, the Decatur Red Devils triumphed 13-0 in the annual turkey day encounter with the Norton Blue Jays and closed the season as the undefeated champions of the Northwest Kansas

League. The game was played on the Norton gridiron with enough chill in the air to make it one of those perfect football days. The victory gave the Red Devils another undefeated season, the second in the past three years, and made it eight successive victories over Norton High. Playing for Oberlin were Olson, le; Rathbun, lt; Moore, lg; Zimmerman, c; Geiger, rg; Buffington, captain, rt; Wiggins, re; Langmade, q; Anderson, rh; Martin, lg and Francis, fl.

Mrs. Sarah Lechler celebrated her 94th birthday in a quiet way at dinner with her niece, Mrs. Lucy Rebman. A pioneer settler, she came from Kentucky in 1885 and with the exception of her eyesight, which is slightly impaired, is in good health and never had the call of a doctor. She has been a widow 70 years and is the only surviving member of a family of 8 children. Her father, Peter Creager, served in the war of 1812 and died at the age of 94; her eldest brother, John, served in the Mexican war and lived to the age of 94; and two sisters lived to the age of 94. She attributes her long and useful life to a peaceful mind, plain living and daily walks.

50 YEARS AGO — Dec. 1955

The board of county commissioners of Decatur County have made arrangements for the new home for the aged to be operated by the Evangelical Lutheran Good Samaritan Society for a period of 10 years at a cost of \$1 per year. This arrangement is similar to the contract with the Lutheran Homes & Hospital Society, which operates the Decatur County Hospital. Under terms of the lease, the lessee will furnish all bedrooms, thus relieving the county of that expense. However, the lessee will ask for public subscriptions for such purpose.

The first storm of the season brought four inches of snow and a wave of cold air that dropped the temperature below zero. From Jan. 1 to Nov. 30 of the year 1955 the moisture total is 13.82, while the 68-year average is 20.20 inches.


Thanksgiving Day 23 members of the Magers family attended the annual Thanksgiving lunch at Lyle. Kathy VanMeter also attended as guest.
