



'Discover the Wonder'

In a few weeks, a movie based on one of my favorite books is coming out, "The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe." In the book we are introduced to four children, Peter, Susan, Edmund and Lucy, who because of the bombing of Britain during WWII find themselves living in a large country home, far away from the danger in London. The children begin to explore the home and they

happen upon a large wardrobe. First Lucy, then the rest of the children, enter the wardrobe and stumble into another world; a world of wonder where they discover talking animals, islands in far away seas, dwarf caves far under the ground, and a great lion named Aslan.

Just as the plain wardrobe opens the door into another world, so we also during Advent open a our world. Advent helps us rediscover the wonder see what God is doing

Advent also opens up a vision of how God will break into our world at the end of time, drawing all things to

Mark tells us in chapter 13, "...stay at your post, keep watch." We are to do this because a door is slowly opening and we need to be ready for what God has for us on the other side. Mark talks about the sun darkening, the moon fading, the stars falling from the skies. It sounds scary, but Mark lets us know that when those things happen, we can be assured God is in control completing his plan for the world, bringing the world to a close. To make sure we are ready, Mark says to keep watch, look for the signs of Jesus' return and keep doing the work he has left us to do.
