The first rectory was built adiacent to the church in 1910 at 306 E. Adams. The house is now owned by Martha (O'Toole) Munson, granddaughter of Stephen O'Toole. Cost of the bungalow was \$1,678, and with furniture, total cost was \$2,189. A cyclone demolished the first

church on July 22, 1911. According to the July 27, 1911, issue of *The* Oberlin Herald, "The rain and windstorm Saturday evening at 5 p.m. was not needed in Oberlin. It wrecked the Catholic Church, blowing it from the foundation and standing it on one corner, making it impossible to ever place it back on the foundation again. One of the greatest losses was the breaking of the fine statue of the Virgin Mary that was presented to the church by Mrs. Mary Heitmann in memory of her husband, J.F. Heitmann. We understand that there will be almost enough insurance to rebuild the structure. The church will be rebuilt

Cost of the new structure was \$994.52, and it was completed on the same site in November or December of 1911 with the Rev. John McNamara as resident priest. A total of \$1,200 was paid by the insurance company.

the church. The Rev. Emil Sinner was appointed pastor in 1950 and the frame church building was enlarged and completely modernized. A 28x70 foot addition was added on the north end of the church and the basement was made into a modern dining and recreation room.

As the fire blazed in 1954, the late Delbert Shields rescued the tabernacle housing the Blessed Sacrament from the altar and carried it to the Bert Berls home nearby. However, the Hammond pipe organ, in the choir loft under the blaze, could not be saved. The new flooring in the church, the pews and the newly modernized basement were damaged only slightly.

The present church and rectory were built of variegated buff brick trimmed with Silverdale limestone. The church, of modified Gothic design, is 98 feet long and 34 feet wide, with an additional 15 feet of width at the covered front entrance and at the sacristy. The top of the cross on the spire at the north end of the church is 52 feet above ground level. Schulmerich carillon bells were installed in 1963.

The first Sunday Mass in the new church was on Palm Sunday, March 25, 1956. The church and the rectory were dedicated on Oct. 24, 1956. would help the city get the figure needed for sure, but it wouldn't make people want to conserve power, said Councilman Ray Ward. He said he was leaning more towards a rate increase, instead of a meter charge increase. That way people have a little more control over what they are using.
