Tips for keeping foods warm

If you're preparing several foods that will finish cooking at different times, you can hold most hot foods for about 15-20 minutes in a preheated oven set to 200-250 degrees Fahrenheit. For longer holding periods the U.S. Department of Agriculture advises, "Set oven temperature high enough to keep the hot food at 140 degrees Fahrenheit or above. Check internal temperature of food with a meat thermometer."

Keeping food hot for extended periods of time may reduce its qual-

Examples of keeping food warm

- Place pancakes or waffles in a single layer on a baking sheet as you make them, if you want to serve them all at the same time. Keep hot takeout food — such
- as barbecued meat or Chinese food warm by transferring it to an oven-safe baking dish and placing it in the oven while you prepare another dish to serve with it. • If you mash potatoes in an oven-
- safe saucepan, place the pan in the oven to stay warm while you finish preparing the rest of the meal. When stir-frying in several

'Are You Ready for the Final Exam?'

What word picture best describes your life right now? Would you say your life is like: a runaway train, a merry-go-round, a humming bird, a target, a salmon swimming upstream, a laser beam, a spinning top, stuck on a treadmill or a boat floating downstream? 
