# 'We need to offer our help'

It's hard for people to ask for help. Sometimes we have to step up and offer it.

In the summer of 2000 the Russian submarine Kursk went plunging to the bottom of the Barents Sea. Eexplosions in the forward torpedo room had left the submarine powerless and un-navigable. The fate of the 118 sailors aboard the sub was not known, though experts believed there would be survivors if a rescue were put together in a hurry.

Several countries including the United States, Great Britain and Norway lined up to offer Russia technological and manpower assistance toward a rescue operation. The Russian response? Nyet! 'We have all the necessary technology to carry out the operation," said the Russian deputy prime min-By official accounts the Russians did not locate

the Kursk, 354 feet below the Barents Sea, until nearly 16 hours after the accident and did not lower the first rescue vessel until an additional 15 hours A day later, the United States and Great Britain


