Teen's organs donated

For 19 years, Jordan Harris was a gift to his family and now, a year after his death in a car accident, he has become a gift to many others.

Harris was like any teenage boy, his mother, Eileen, said. He loved his car — a 1996 black Blazer, his friends, KU basketball, Denver Broncos football and most high school sports.

Jordan was a grandson of the late Don Harris and Irmadene (Johnston) Harris of Oberlin, and a greatnephew of Imogene Keenan of Jennings. His father, Doug Harris, is a 1974 graduate of Decatur Community High School.

Considered shy and quiet around teachers and acquaintances, Jordan was known to be a witty, energetic guy with his close friends - showing compassion when it came to helping other students.

When Jordan was a junior and playing basketball for the Colby Eagles in the 2002-2003 season, his mom said, a freshman was promoted to the varsity.

"It is really tough making that move when I was a freshman," said Matt Augustine, who graduated from Colby High School last year. "If it hadn't been for Jordan, I don't think I would have made it.'

He said Jordan took him under his wing and made him feel like he was part of the team.

It's been a year since then. His mother said the thing that's helped her the most was something her son volunteered to do three years prior.

Eileen, 49, recalled talking with Jordan about being an organ donor when he applied for his driver's license at age 16. The two of them discussed that option in the event of his death.

She remembers Jordan saying, 'Sure, definitely I will do that."

Because of the way he treated others, she said, it wasn't surprising that Jordan's compassion would carry over in deciding to be an organ do-

From that decision, she said, the Harris family, which includes sister, Angie, and father, Doug, is beginning to see something they can hang on to.

The family isn't sure exactly who benefited from Jordan's organ donations.

Family members attended an event in December in Kansas City hosted by Midwest Transplant, which took Jordan's donations.

This "life celebration" brought families of donors and recipients together.

"This has helped me more than anything," she said, "and even though the people I spoke with didn't have Jordan's donations, it still meant a lot."

The exchange of friendships and seeing how many people could have hope again was important to her, she said.

"I want to know the people and build a bond with them one day," she said. "Becoming an organ donor is a good thing, and if there is a way I can help get the word out, I want to do that.'
