not the ones most often labeled; pride, envy, glutcross and therefore the truth of their forgiveness is only a confession away.

No, the true Seven Deadly Sins are the sins against the Holy Spirit which lead us down a path where the ultimate conclusion is death, even for those who once were given forgiveness in Christ.

The Seven Deadly Sins about which I speak are found in the book of Revelation and are expressed in the seven letters to the seven churches. These letters are written as a way to prepare the reader for the message to follow; the message of God's redeeming mercy and grace from the Garden of Eden to eternity. But before the reader can grasp the understanding of the saving grace of God, he or she must be open to what the Spirit says; and that begins with the letter to the church in Ephesus. It is here where we find the first deadly sin.


