play the word game. In today's world we are supposed to be politically correct in how we speak about people and their various qualities and opinions. As a white American male I am ethnically challenged. I am not overweight; I am just maintaining an abundance of energy reserves.

Our world has become a world without any clear definitions as to what is right or wrong. It all just depends upon how it is said and how it is interpreted.

Hermeneutics is the science or art of interpretation. It is the digging beneath the surface meaning of the words spoken and getting to the heart of what they mean. And, regrettably, it is becoming a lost art in today's culture. One need only look at the abortion and gay-marriage issues to see how our culture is caught up in the superficial battle of words instead of the truth hidden deep within them.

We have fallen into the same trap as the church in Thyatira (Rev. 2:18-29). We have misinterpreted what it means to be made alive in Christ and have defined life as nothing more than the pleasures of leath upon the cross and turned it into a superficial "live for the day" attitude. The death of hermeneutics is only the fourth step critical step. Once the proper interpretation of the clares to you, "Your sins are forgiven!"

We are all familiar with the way different groups Scriptures dies, there is nothing more to grab onto in the sea of despair than lightly floating words that have no depth of meaning. The words offer the promise of salvation but flip over and pull you down with them.

Like the sweet words of Jezebel, they promise life but do nothing more than kill. As we give in to the false teaching our faith is beaten down to the point where it becomes comatose. And this was the state that the church in Sardis found itself in.

The church in Sardis (Rev. 3:1-6) was at the point of near death. If they did not wake up and strengthen what faith remained they would be facing certain death. God's call to them was to remember what you have received and heard, remember the gift of Christ crucified and the proclamation He made, "Your sins are forgiven!'

They were commanded by God to obey it, to yield themselves to the truth of God's Law which condemns, and obey the truth of the Gospel that makes them alive. They were commanded to repent, to turn away from the dead works they were doing and lay hold of that which is truly life.

The Lenten season reminds us that our life is not this world. We have taken the deeper truth of Jesus' found in this world. All we do in this world is take in and expel death. This world is not full of the living, but


