Rummage sale helps raise cash for museum

Tables lined the Bohemian Hall on Saturday and Sunday, stacked with clothes, dishes, glasses, shoes and other garage-sale type items.

For most of the month, the Last Indian Raid Museum had been asking for "gently used" items to be sold to help raise money for its programs.

Saturday morning, the sale, sponsored by KFNF Radio, opened with people ready to search through the tables for treasures to take home. Throughout the day, many came and went, with a steady crowd buying items.

On Sunday, the doors opened at noon for the \$1 bag sale, which included anything a person could fit into a plastic grocery sack.

Curator Sharleen Wurm said the

sale had gone well, and they sold quite a few items.

Things that were left at the end of the day on Sunday either went to the Bargain Box Plus or the Sappa Valley Youth Ranch in Oberlin, she said, or will go to a mission in Denver.

Mrs. Wurm said the museum raised \$1,000 more than they did last year. She said she didn't want to say the total that was raised. The money will be used for maintenance and projects at the museum. She said they have a lot of projects going on or others that they want to do, so the money isn't earmarked for anything in particular.

This is the fifth year the museum has held the sale.
