A similar organization will be effected in the counties of Sheridan and Gove on the same day. It is suggested that a company be formed who will hold themselves in readiness to prevent, by force if necessary, the passage of cattle over the Old-Trail or to help the officers of the county in enforcing the law. Each county should elect two delegates to meet at Kenneth, Sheridan County, on Saturday, May 7, to effect a central organization. Let there be a general turn-
