# Gear up for home canning

Spring is the time to get ready for canning your potential bumper crop of fruits and vegetables in the coming months.

Here's a quick checklist to get ready for canning:

- For canning vegetables and meat, a pressure canner must be used. Dial gauges must be tested yearly for accuracy. Contact your county extension office for easy testing, which can be done when I am in the office.
- The rubber gasket on pressure canners should be soft and pliable. Replace if cracked, sticky or brittle.
- Inventory jars. Check for chips and cracks and discard damaged jars, or use them for non-food pur-

- Buy new lids. Never reuse lids. Buy enough lids for each canning season for best results.
- Inspect rings for dents and rust, and check to see if they are bent. Rings can be reused if in good con-

ness. Check at your extension office for up-to-date canning recipes.

# 'Beyond the Grave—Part 2'

Days of Easter! Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! Today we continue reading the Gospel of Mark's Easter Day account of Jesus' resurrection (Mark 16:1-8), with a message based on a Bible study by Robin McCullough-Bade.

Sometimes one little word can make all the difference. What one word would you use to describe the meaning of Easter Sunday? No doubt many wonderful words come to mind. Think instead, of a simple three-letter word which flavors the Easter story in Mark's gospel: the word "but." This word is scattered throughout the eight verses of Mark 16 in strategic places.

The women are frightened, "but" the angelic messenger calms their fears. They have come to find the body of Jesus, "but" they hear instead the incredible news that he is risen. They are awestruck, filled with terror and amazement, yet they are told, "But go, tell ...."

They feel powerless, unable to stop death, unable us wherever we find ourselves to be. to move away the large stone entombing their Lord.

"But ...." (There it is again!) "But" the stone is ours in the resurrection of Jesus. Amen

The Church continues to celebrate the Great 50 rolled away. "But" Jesus is not there. "But" Christ is

Can you think of the significance of this one little word in your daily life? Pain and difficulties can weigh us down like a cold stone that cannot be budged. Death and sorrow can cover us as a shroud. Guilt and anxiety, fear of the future or frustration over the past can indeed entomb us, with seemingly no light at the end of the tunnel.

"But" God pulls off the greatest reversal of all in the resurrection of Christ. The last word spoken is not death, "but" life; not sorrow, "but" joy; not guilt, "but" forgiveness.

Old definitions of what can or cannot be no longer apply since God acted at Easter. God breaks down the locked doors of whatever it is that shuts us in; and, God promises wonderful surprises through that little word, "but." "But" there is something more. This wonderful news
