Commissioners approve \$10,000 for runway dirt work

The Decatur County commissioners agreed to give \$10,000 to the city-county Economic Development Corp. to help pay for dirt work for a runway near Jennings requested by a firm that wants to buy the old school there.

Commissioner Ralph Unger asked about the rest of the work for the runway, including lights, radio, fencing and fuel tanks. Who is in charge of that work and who is going to maintain the runway? he asked. No one knew the answer.

Commissioner Doyle Brown said people are being contacted about private donations for the dirt work. The group asked for \$10,000 from the county, said Mr. Brown.

The commissioners agreed to help with the ads and gas. give the \$10,000 to help attract the firm, which wants to turn the school into a plant to renovate used buses. If the money isn't used for a contractor to do the dirt work by, they said, the county expects to be paid back.

The commissioners discussed whether they need to increase the fee for the transportation bus from \$1 a ride to \$2 to help with higher fuel bills.

The budget from the state did increase a little, said County Clerk Marilyn Horn, but that is to pay for weekly ads in the newspaper, which is required by the state.

Maybe the price should be increased to \$2, said Mr. Unger, to They didn't make a decision.






