(Continued from Page 1A) should be in a secured facility. He said the two were placed at the ranch and they have been trying to move them out, but that takes at least 10 days.

They weren't moved quick enough, he said, but it looked like both would be gone by Monday.

The boys planned to pull the fire alarm at a certain time, he said, and that was a signal for the others to leave their houses. Not all of the boys took part in the riot, he said, but 16 did, and that was enough that the staff felt they needed to call the police.

Mr. Kelsey said they are still working on charges against the ringleaders, but he isn't sure what will happen.

The ranch, he said, had the required number of staff on duty Saturday, one staff to every seven boys. The ranch has 24 kids now, and they had four staff members.
