(Continued from Page 1A) has asked the Greater Salina Community Foundation to manage its money. Because the Salina group has a federal tax exemption certificate, he said, all of the donations should be 100 percent tax deduct-

Although the board looked at managing its own money, he said, it would be time consuming to meet all the federal guidelines.

The Salina foundation charges nothing on the investment, said Dr. Olson, but once a year it will get 1 percent of the return for administrative costs.

If the foundation board were to do everything on its own, he said, it would cost 3 to 5 percent.

This way, the principle will never be touched, said Dr. Olson, so the fund should last forever. The goal is to raise \$1 million in the first year,

So far, said Dr. Olson, there have been several donations, with about \$300,000 in commitments. He said one person will be getting \$550,000 in the next two years and has talked about giving it to the foundation.

The board members said they want to do something for the town and for its kids.

"Someone helped me to get to where I am," said Dr. Olson. "I want to help others.'

Mr. Shields said he hopes they can get to the point where every child who walks out of this high school and wants to go on to get more education will have some kind of schol-

Let's say the school were to terminate, said Dr. Olson, it would be up to the board to make a decision. The money, though, would stay with the Oberlin students, even if they end up going to a regional school.

Is there a provision that the foundation could handle something like the Rotary scholarship? asked Steve Haynes. Yes, said Dr. Olson, the money can go through the general fund or Rotary could be part of the Founder's Club if they invested the


