Warm weather would seem an invitation to move meals outdoors, yet cooking out – or grilling – is not without risks.

Common food safety mistakes, especially underestimating cooking times or overlooking the need to check cooked temperatures, increase the risk of foodborne illness.

Meat scientists and researchers at Kansas State University found that ground beef browns at different $rates, so\,browning, long\,considered$ an indication ground beef is cooked, is no longer an accurate indicator of With meats and poultry, the only

sure way to test safety and doneness is by using a meat thermometer. Primary foodborne pathogens, including salmonella, campylobacter and E. coli 0157:H7, are heat sensitive. That means cooking foods to recommended temperatures will kill any pathogens. For ground beef, the recom-

mended cooked temperature is 160 degrees. For beef, veal and lamb roasts, steaks and chops, medium is 160 degrees and well done, 170 deground pork, medium is 160 degrees and well done, 170 degrees. All poultry should reach a minimum


