"Our Fathers had the tabernacle of witness..." - Acts 7:44 (King James Version)

In this scripture, Luke through the power of the Holy Spirit is admonishing the Jewish believers. Martin and Evelyn May were Sunday afternoon visitors of Jack and Mildred Fortin.

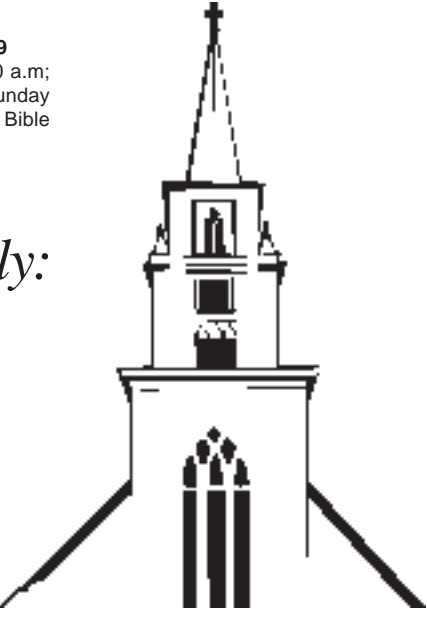
