She said that when she graduated from high school, her parents told her, "All we ask of you is that you leave the world a little better than you found it."

"Ihope, at least for the families we see dealing with these devastating diseases, that the support we provide has made their world a little better and a bit easier," she says.

Ms. Anderson said that the MDA Neuromuscular Center at Integris Southwest Medical Center opened in July of 2004 and they have been blessed with incredible success and attention since.

"Just 10 months later," she recalled, "we were chosen to be profiled on the National Jerry Lewis MDA Labor Day Telethon. While the national film crew was in town taping for the Telethon, we were also able to arrange for the filming of Oklahoma Gov. Brad Henry and the First Lady for the national show. The Henrys were one of the first families I met when I started with MDA over 15 years ago. Their daughter Lindsay had a neuromuscular disease and died at 7 months.

"When we opened the clinic, our five-year goal was to become an MDA/ALS center, one of a select group of clinics that meet standards set by MDA to care for people with ALS (Lou Gehrig's disease). With a lot of hard work, we were able to earn this designation in less than two vears!

"Opening the clinic and receiving all this national recognition is the culmination of more than a decade of hard work. It first began when Brent Beson, medical director of the clinic, had just graduated from high school and I recruited him to be a camp volunteer. > Brent volunteered at the camp, we became good friends with a common vision ... a state-of-the-art neuromuscular center with a multidisciplinary team of experts dedicated to providing hope, help and health care to people with muscular dystrophy and related disorders.

"We are now able to of our patients at no direct cost to those we serve. I guess the idea that 'If you build it, they will come' works, as we now have people traveling from at least five states to our

center. What many people don't realize is that MDA covers 43 different neuromuscular disorders. In addition to the muscular dystrophies and ALS, we also cover myasthenia gravis, hereditary neuropathies, inflammatory myopathies, spinal muscular atrophy, and other muscle diseases. "Although I am extremely proud

of the clinic. I am also humbled by the honor of being able to work with such a caring team of professionals who put service to others first.


"Working with families who are dealing with these devastating diseases really gives you a great respect for the depth of the human spirit. So many of our patients and their families are such exceptional people. They deal with extraordinary pain and difficulty with great grace, dignity and in many cases, incredible humor. It is such a privilege to be able to provide even a little hope, comfort and care.

"One of our main goals was to become a designated MDA/ALS center. There were only 35 clinics in the nation that had received this designation, with most being large university-based research clinics.

"We had hoped to reach this goal within five years of opening, but enthusiasm from our clinic team helped us meet the criteria and we received designation as an MDA/ ALS center in less than two years, dedicating the Integris MDA/ALS Center in May 2006."

Ms. Anderson said that her philosophy is, "Don't just live the length of your life; live the width of it as well."


