125 YEARS AGO - July 1881

Independence Day at Oberlin: 1,000 settlers, old and new, of the "Great American Sahara" meet and greet and renew their allegiance to the Old Flag. The largest crowd ever in Oberlin. But the reported assassination of President Garfield cast a gloom over the occasion.

Hon. A.G. McBride, editor of the *Kirwin Chief*, was orator of the day and three baseball clubs contested for the ball and bat, put up as prize by the Herald: The Country Boys of Prairie Dog; the Stars of Vallonia and the Beaver Club. A game between the Stars and Beavers was abruptly closed at the fifth inning in consequence of a misunderstanding between the umpire and the players. The Beavers were considerably ahead and were considered entitled to, and received, the ball and bat.
