name of Dame Juliana Berners for inventing "sport fishing." Prior to this time, it was strictly catch by what ever means possible. Fishing was not considered a sport, it was a way of survival.

On a piece of parchment in England, there is an inked writing by this Catholic nun who was born to a royal family and did some hunting and fishing as a girl.

After she entered the Convent at St. Alban, she wrote the first known works on fishing.

This woman wasn't a slouch – she developed the idea of a fishing rod, in that time called a pole. Fishing then became the art of angling as she

She recommended that one cut a smooth six-foot staff of willow or aspen, heat it in an oven, get it good and straight, and let it dry for about four weeks. The nun-cum-angler took a piece of plumber's wire, heated it red hot, and burned a hole through the staff. Then the staff was stored in a smokehouse for a period

After this was done, she wrote that the angler should stroll through the woods and cut a slender slip (similar to a whip) of hazel wood the same length as the staff. Soak it thoroughly, then straighten it out, and let it dry in the smokehouse also.

sport, men owe a woman by the ners outlined was to trim the hazel wood whip so it could be inserted into the butt section of the willow staff. Then she fashioned a metal pin to hold the two limbs together, making a two-section fishing rod (kind of like a two-piece break down rod

She advocated that the two-piece stick also became a good walking stick, and if you came upon a nice fishing hole on your daily walk, you would be ready to fish.

For line, she used long horsehairs woven together and colored in a mixture of ale, crushed walnut leaves, and alum. Such a line, she felt, blended with the water and fooled the fish.

In her tips for anglers, Dame Juliana Berners recommended not to cast a shadow on the water as it would spook the fish.

One should fish below the waterfalls or in deep pools, fish when the wind is either out of the south or west, and use a wire leader when fishing for pike.

Her last recommendation, almost 600 years old, is true today: choose your bait wisely. Fish only strike what they like to eat.

So, who says fishing is only for the guys? My suggestion is, take your girlfriend or wife out on a fishing date some time. You just may get a partner for life. I did.
