Board transfers money

The Oberlin School Board transferred \$302,336 into four accounts to end the old year and get things started for next year.

The board held an 11-minute meeting at 7 a.m. Friday, June 30, to tie up a few loose ends on the last day of the fiscal year.

At the end of each year, the board approves transferring any money left into food service, special education, contingency reserve and capital outlay to help get started for the coming school year.

The board transferred \$26,900 into food service, \$150,000 into special education, \$70,886 into contingency reserve and \$54,550 into capital outlay.

The group also approved the transfer of \$65,000 earned through interest on the district's account into capital outlay.

The board approved the hiring of Linda Weber as the cook/bread maker and Tim Thornton as a grade school teacher. The teaching assignments at the grade school have not been determined as yet, however.

Mr. Thornton graduated in May from Kansas State University. Mrs. Weber is a cook at the hospital.

The board approved the revised Oberlin Elementary School handbook with no major changes.
