School Board chooses leaders to start new year

Board Members Dewayne Jackson and Jeannie Martin agreed to keep their positions as president and vice president.



Sheriff's deputy leaving

Sheriff's Deputy Michael French has handed in his resignation and plans to move to Trego County for a new job.

Deputy French has worked with the sheriff's office for almost three years, said Sheriff Ken Badsky.

Sheriff Ken Badsky told Decatur County commissioners at their meeting last Tuesday about the resignation, saying that Deputy French's last day will be Monday, July 31.

With Undersheriff Randy McHugh overseas serving in the National Guard, Sheriff Badsky had just hired two part-time deputies. He said he has asked Deputy Jay Tate to take the full-time position instead of the part-time one, and he has accepted.

Deputy Tate is already working part-time, but will start full-time on Tuesday, Aug. 1. Although Deputy Tate has worked in law enforcement, said Sheriff Badsky, it has only been part-time in the past so he does need some more training.

Sheriff Badsky said he has been trying to replace the sheriff's vehicles every few years. The 1994 Chevy Caprice has 155,000 miles on it, he said, and he would like to replace it.

He said he is looking at a Dodge Charger with a Hemi engine for around \$22,500. There wasn't any action taken.

The Chevy Caprice, he said, could then be sold online.

Deputy Patti Skubal is planning to go to school in August, said Sheriff Badsky, to learn how to do purchasing through the Kansas Highway Patrol.
