Nomination deadline near

Farmers have until Tuesday, Aug. 1, to nominate candidates for an open seat on the U.S. Farm Service Agency's county committee.

"County committees play a vital role in the administration of federal farm programs," said Diane Barrett, executive director of the agency's Decatur County office. "I encourage all producers to make a difference by nominating eligible candidates to serve on this important com-

County committees make decisions on commodity price support loans, conservation and disaster programs, employing the county executive director and other agricultural issues, she said.

To be eligible, a candidate must participate in a program administered by agency, be eligible to vote in the election and live in the administrative area served by the seat they are seeking.

The seat open this year serves Area 2, covering the northeast part of the county. Mrs. Barrett said it is
