Although Monday, the "no-watering" day, started the week out well, hot weather soon had the flow up with the temperatures.

By the end of the week, somewhat cooler temperatures and a little moisture helped to bring things back

The city is still on water restrictions, which means those with even addresses can water outside those with odd addresses on Tues-Wednesday, Friday and Sunday and



can water from midnight to 9 a.m. and from 8 p.m. to midnight.

No outside water use — watering, washing cars, filling pools and the like — is allowed on Monday.
