75 YEARS AGO - Aug. 1931 Oberlin narrowly missed one of its most serious fires Saturday morning when by great work on the part of the fire fighters and a little good luck in the direction of the wind, the fire which originated in the tankhouse of the Home Oil Co. bulk station in southeast Oberlin was prevented from spreading to the tanks of the four other Oberlin companies located just east of those which burned.

As the heat from the burning gasoline increased, bystanders (half the town were interested spectators by this time) were warned to keep back. It seems to be the great American privilege to do as they please,
