

> 'The computers get plenty of work, but I still teach paper and pencil drafting, which a lot of people don't anymore. I want students familiar with the older tools of the trade for a number of reasons.

"Pencil and paper is quick. You computer — you have to turn on the computer, wait for it to come on start the software. If you just want to give somebody a quick idea of what you're talking about, you don' need that. If you're out on a job site you won't have your computer there.'

His drafting, engineering and architecture courses attract a variety of students, he said.

"There's the ones who want to be who want to design video games,' he said, "and we get students interested in art. We don't do freehand drawing, but an art student can learn about spatial relationships."

Each year, his class builds bridge spans out of eighth-inch basswood string and paper, then tests them by driving a radio-controlled truck over them. The truck is topped with more and more weight until the bridge fails.
