$\mathbf{1 2 5}$ YEARS AGO - Sept. 1881
Dr. Mead moved out on his
homestead the first of the month.

At about $5: 30$ last Friday after-
noon aquick succession of four pis-
tol shots startled the people of
Oberlin who were within hearing
distance and as the news spread that
two men had been killed the shock
extended. Many who were on the
streets at the time and others who
were in the business houses rushed
to the scene of the affray, which
occurred in the law office of Burt \&
McGonigal. On arriving there John
Henry was found lying at the back
door dying from the effects of two
pistol shot wounds and another
young man, Robert Gaston, was
found severely wounded by a shot
in the right breast, which was se-
vere, though at present writing not
considered fatal.
