

Church calls new pastor

Fred Dycus of Goodland is serving as pastor of the Oberlin Community Fellowship. He said he accepted the call to the church in January, but he and his wife still live in Goodland.

He said he is a Bible preacher focusing on word study in order to know the truth of the scriptures. He drives to Burlington, Colo., to work at the correctional facility and his wife works in Colby.

His family moved around when he was young, he said, because his father was in the Air Force. He said some of his greatest memories growing up were the four years he lived in Turkey, where he saw several Biblical sites. He said it was during one of those visits that he felt the call to preach.

Pastor Dycus said he attended Dallas Baptist University and Mid-

western Baptist Theological Seminary and has served six churches in the 30 years he has been in the ministry. He has been to Israel twice and reports it as being "awesome to see and walk the land of our Messiah." He has served during a Missionary Evangelical Conference in the Virgin Islands, as well as several mission trips and countless revivals.

"My wife and I are looking forward to the day we can move to Oberlin full-time," he said, "joining the community, supporting the schools and attending the sports activities."

Morning worship begins at 10:30 a.m. Sundays and an in-depth Bible study is held at 6:30 p.m. AWANA group is held for the kids at 4 p.m. The church is at the junction of North Penn Ave. and Frontier Parkway.
