Engine show, parades, food set for weekend

By KIMBERLY DAVIS Antique vehicles, tractors, engines, baked goods, pumpkin painting, performances, parades and more will mark a big weekend in Oberlin, with the action starting Saturday morning.

Both the Mini Sappa Antique Thresher and Engine Show at the fairground and Mini Sapa Day at the Last Indian Raid Museum will start that morning, offering lots of family entertainment.

The two events are held on the same weekend in early October, with the celebration at the museum on Saturday and the antique show on both Saturday and Sunday.

At the fairground, the Mini Sappa Antique Thresher and Engine club will be threshing wheat and cutting wood using some of the old machinery equipment. There will also be quilt and apron shows.

The club will have a dynamometer that people can hook up their tractors to test horsepower. The suggested price is \$5 per test.

Entrance to the fairgrounds is \$3 for adults and 50 cents for children and under each day.

Other activities at the fairground include:

• Church services at 8:30 a.m. on Sunday with Jim Plotts of Norcatur preaching.

• Breakfast at 7 a.m. and lunch each day at the 4-H Building.

• A poker run at 11 a.m. Saturday. All participants must be in a vintage vehicle or tractor.

• A kids' pedal tractor pull at 2 p.m. on Sunday.

• A stock garden tractor pull at 12:30 p.m. Saturday. The hook-up

At the museum, things kick off at 7 a.m. with a benefit pancake-andham breakfast at the Old Bohemian Hall. This will be the 48th year for Mini Sapa, which was started as an open house and celebration for the victims who survived the 1879 Indian raid.

Admission to the museum will be free all day.

A new attraction this year will be a laser-shot computer hunting simulator owned by the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks. People can use it from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

There will be a craft fair in the museum courtyard. Vendors will be selling items including Pampered Chef, sweatshirts, baby blankets, sewing and crocheted items, jellies, leather, kids' books, jewelry-making supplies, metal lawn ornaments and blacksmith supplies.
