# Keep all game birds chilled

Concerns about avian flu need not spoil hunting season. Avian-or bird – flu is not new. Current concerns focus on a new, virulent strain found in Asia.

The new bird flu has not yet been found in North America, but scientists watch migratory birds and hunters are encouraged to look for distressed birds and to follow foodsafety in field dressing, storing and cooking game birds.

- Look for obvious signs that a bird is in distress. See the K-State Avian Influenza Web site for more details on identifying sick birds at www.avianflu.ksu.edu.
- Field dress birds promptly. - Do not pile warm birds in a
- -Remove the entrails and crop as soon as possible, as grain in the crop can ferment if not removed. To save the heart and liver as
- bag. Label to identify the bird before placing the bag on ice. -Birds can be plucked or skinned

giblets, transfer them to a plastic

- in the field and feathers stored in a plastic bag. - Wipe out the cavity with a clean
- cloth or paper towel. Do not use grass or snow that may contaminate the carcass. Place birds in individual plas-
- tic bags. Label to identify the bird, date, and location it was bagged before placing it on ice.



## **Home Time**

Birds can be stored in the refrig-check doneness with a food thererator (45 degrees Fahrenheit or less) for up to three days, or frozen as either a whole, clean carcass or in parts, at 0 degrees for future

- Wash hands in hot, soapy water before and after handling game. hands do not have visible dirt before using hand sanitizers.
- To reduce the risk of cross contamination, don't eat, drink or smoke when field dressing game.
- Keep ice chest out of direct sun.
- Assemble a field dressing kit with soap, water jug and/or hand sanitizer, paper towels, cutting board(s), knives, sharpening stone, resealable plastic bags, plastic or a marker to field dress birds before transferring them to an ice chest.
- Follow U.S. Department of cook poultry to 165 degrees and

Cooking poultry and game birds to 165 degrees will kill food borne pathogens.

 To disinfect the field dressing kit before storing, sanitize knives, cutting board, etc., with a solution If water is unavailable, waterless of one teaspoon of unscented chlohand sanitizers will work. Be sure rine bleach mixed with one quart of water. A dishwasher will work if utensils and gear are dishwasher

> Washing your hands and keeping food preparation tools and work spaces clean can reduce the risk of foodborne illness and cross con-


