

County gets disaster nod

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has designated 57 Kansas counties as primary natural disaster areas due to losses caused by the combined effects of disasters during the past year, including a late spring freeze, drought, winds and heat.

Those in this area include Decatur, Rawlins, Sheridan, Norton, Cheyenne, Gove, Graham, Logan, Phillips, Sherman and Thomas.

The counties were designated as natural disaster areas on Oct. 12, making all qualified farm operators eligible for low-interest emergency loans from the Farm Service Agency. They have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for loans to help cover part of their ac-


