# County buying new Dodge car for the sheriff

The Decatur County commissioners agreed Tuesday to let the sheriff buy a new Dodge Charger to replace a patrol car wrecked in a chase last month.

Sheriff Ken Badsky said he sent out bid specs for a Dodge to companies in the area and received six back, which the commissioners

Sheriff Badsky said he wants to replace the sedan with another car. The office has a Dodge Durango and two trucks, he said.
